Yesterday's *Leader* reports that the young man accused of murdering his stepfather in Port Ludlow has been identified as Jason L Carpenter, who, at the time of the stabbing, was just shy of his 18th birthday. According to his records, Carpenter has a history of mental instability. This has led to outbreaks of rage and impulsive behavior in the past. Judge Keith Harper accepted the recommendation from the prosecutor for no bail, and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney, Anna Phillips is going to try Carpenter as an adult.

Washington traffic fatalities continue to surge in 2022 even as numbers have started to flatten or decline in other states. So far this year, there have been over 700 traffic fatalities, several on the Olympic Peninsula. Yesterday morning, the *Seattle Times* reported on a nightmare scenario on interstate 90 east of Ellensburg that counted 30 vehicles in a pileup caused by ice and foggy conditions. Twelve semi trucks were involved. Traffic was held up for 12 hours!

But here's some good traffic news from the *Peninsula Daily News*. The road to Hurricane Ridge are being plowed to allow the snowboard and ski areas to open this weekend. A fire damaged one of the area snowplows last Friday and the road to Hurricane Ridge could not be cleared. Another snow plow has been brought in to clear the road and there's adequate snow up there. So now the ski season can begin.

Yesterday's *Leader* reports that the defenders of the Raccoon Lodge were out in force on Monday at the city council meeting. City Manager John Mauro said the city had left several options on the table and felt they had been flexible and willing to work with Kevin Mason, the builder who created the tree house. Mauro admitted that he enjoyed it as much as others, but the city is still going to require that a structural engineer certify its safety and insurance is still an issue.

Architect Ann Raab has volunteered to make drawings which she said would be the first step in getting the structure permitted. She said, "We're just going to do it one by one to see how we satisfy the city." *The Leader* then quoted several citizen-art supporters at length. Here are a few of their voices:

- "Creative elements of our community should be protected and promoted. Please save our art tree."
- "Fun projects like these are why people come to visit Port Townsend."
- "It surpasses most of the public art in the city that was chosen by committee and didn't cost the city a penny, You should be thanking Mr. Mason, not harassing him."

Let's hope that at some point, the Lodge will make it through this controversy.
