

Good afternoon, thanks for being with us at 91.9 KPTZ FM. I'm Simon Jaynes in Port Townsend, Washington with local news for Friday, December 30, 2022.

On Wednesday, a U.S. Coast Guard helicopter from the Port Angeles Air Station crossed the Canadian border to rescue a grounded sailor and two canine passengers. According to the *Port Townsend Leader*, watchstanders in Seattle received a report that a sailing vessel had gone aground about three miles west of the town of Jordan River in the Strait of Juan de Fuca. The area is on the Canadian side of the strait, but the situation was urgent and the boat was being battered by waves. Air Station Port Angeles – located just 35 miles to the southeast of Jordan River – launched a Dolphin rescue helicopter to the scene. They arrived around 1am Wednesday and rescued two occupants – one human sailor and one dog. They delivered both to shore at the Canadian Coast Guard's station in Victoria BC, where emergency medical services were waiting to evaluate the survivors.

On Wednesday morning, according to information published in *The Maritime Executive*, the aircrew flew back to the scene of the wreck to conduct an overflight and assess the situation. At about 11am the team spotted another dog on shore in a rocky, isolated cove. They deployed their rescue swimmer to recover it, and transported the dog back to rejoin its owner at the Canadian Coast Guard station. No word on the exact circumstances that caused the boat to run aground in the first place. But the *Leader* article went on to quote Lt. John Schultz, a pilot at Air Station Port Angeles, praising the officers for their part in the rescue. "AET3 Austen Marshall and AST1 Lucas Wengrin did a phenomenal job effecting a challenging rescue in the heavy surf, as the sailing vessel smashed against the rocks," Schulz said. "Their patience and technical expertise directly lead to the safe recovery of the mariner and his two dogs. We are thankful for the happy outcome." The Coast Guard said the search-and-rescue mission was conducted in coordination with Joint Rescue Coordination Centre Victoria.

The deadline to apply for the Olympic Peninsula Small Business Boost program that will offer free legal, marketing, and bookkeeping services to small businesses and nonprofits is tomorrow, December 31. This program is designed to assist small businesses seeking help with marketing, bookkeeping and legal business structuring. Applications are being accepted online through Saturday.

The two-week case rate for COVID-19 in Jefferson County is 392 per 100,000. The risk of COVID-19 transmission in public, indoor places is high. It will be very important to keep caution in mind going into potential New Year's Eve festivities tomorrow night. According to Jefferson County Public Health, "Communities across our state and around the U.S. are experiencing an unprecedented surge in viral respiratory illnesses, including RSV, influenza, and COVID-19." The *Port Townsend Leader* ran an article on Wednesday detailing the strain this trifecta of respiratory illnesses is placing on local medical facilities. Public Hospital District Commissioner Kees Kolff was quoted saying that, "patient volumes are rising again... We currently have on average 21 to 23 inpatients. And remember, this is a 25-bed maximum hospital." The Washington State

Department of Health also urges mask wearing and staying up to date on vaccines during this surge. “In addition to RSV and influenza, new COVID-19 variants are taking hold and immunity from past vaccination is waning for many people who have not yet received an updated booster shot. The surge in these viruses has resulted in rising absenteeism in schools this fall. The impact of which extends to businesses, workers, and families.
