The public is invited to attend a community meeting later today hosted by Habitat for Humanity of East Jefferson County and the Rotary Club of East Jefferson County to discuss the development of an affordable housing project planned at Port Hadlock's old airfield on Cedar Avenue and Mason Street. As reported in the *PT Leader*, the community meeting is this afternoon at 5:30pm Thursday, March 23 in the Humphrey Room at the Jefferson County Library on Cedar Avenue. The meeting will provide local residents, businesses, and organizations an opportunity to engage in a conversation about affordable housing needs in Port Hadlock, address questions about permanently affordable housing, and provide feedback on their hopes for habitat's plans.

Habitat for Humanity purchased a 17-acre former airstrip in Port Hadlock last May with the goal of providing permanently affordable, mixed-income housing. Habitat envisions an attractive, vibrant neighborhood of mixed, single, and multi-family housing adjacent to Chimacum Creek Primary School and close to the Jefferson County Library. The land has the potential to support more than 120 homes for families and individuals, local residents in the workforce, and retirees.

Paul Rogers, the Rotary Club's president is quoted as saying: "In keeping with Rotary's vision – a world in which people unite and take action to create lasting change – we are partnering with Habitat to host this meeting to discuss what affordable housing might look like in Port Hadlock. We believe this development will have a positive impact on the local economy and we want to help facilitate that."

Maria Drury, executive director of Habitat said, "Similar to Rotary's vision, Habitat's mission is to bring people together to build homes, communities, and hope. We look forward to discussions about what the development in Port Hadlock might look like with members of our community, be they individual neighbors, business owners, or anyone affected by the need for affordable housing."

From The Washington State Fire Marshal: When children are exposed to flame or fires, their curiosity might be piqued. Children may find fire fascinating because it engages all five senses. They may not understand that fires used for cooking, heating, or other reasons are controlled and used for specific purposes. They may not understand the devastation hostile fires can cause like the loss of property, injuries, or death. From 2019 through 2021, local fire agencies in Washington State reported 764 incidents that began by playing with a heat source, resulting in over \$5 million in damages. To help prevent youth firesetting, the Washington State Fire Marshal's Office asks that parents and other caregivers take the following steps:

- Keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children, up high, and preferably in a locked cabinet.
- Closely supervise children, making sure that they are kept away from other fire sources, including lit cigarettes, candles, bonfires, and stoves.
- Establish clear rules and consequences about unsupervised and unauthorized uses of fire.
- Teach children that they must tell a grownup when matches or lighters are found.
- Talk with children about what they are seeing online in video games, on TV, in movies, and on social media, and teach them specific ways to resist the peer pressure to misuse fire.
- Give praise for showing respect and age-appropriate responsible behavior toward fire.
- Contact your local fire department to see if they have a youth firesetting (prevention) program.
