By order of Governor Jay Inslee, the state of Washington has purchased 30,000 doses of the abortion pill Mifepristone. This drug is legal in the state to end pregnancy up to 10 weeks, and it was approved for use by the Federal Food and Drug Administration two decades ago. However, a Texas judge is presiding over a case challenging the FDA's approval. And that could impact women's freedom to access the abortion pill here in Washington. The governor added, "We are not sitting idly by while that threat exists. We recognize in Washington that the price of a woman's freedom of choice is eternal vigilance." Inslee said he directed the state Department of Corrections to purchase a three-year supply of Mifepristone. Those 30,000 doses cost \$1.275 million, averaging at \$42.50 per pill. Inslee said he asked the University of Washington to also purchase a supply of the medication. The university agreed and now has 10,000 doses, which creates about four years of backup of the abortion pill. The governor said that if the court ruling brings a halt in the manufacturing of the abortion pill, it will not affect access, because the decision would be to stop the manufacture, not the possession, of the drug. Inslee said the second step of this process is to authorize distribution of the medication to healthcare facilities and providers. To move forward on that, state senator Karen Keiser filed a bill authorizing the Department of Corrections to acquire, sell, deliver, distribute, and dispense abortion medication.

In environmental news, Meaningful Movies Port Townsend will host an online screening of the documentary titled *DamNation*, this Monday evening. This movie travels across America, looking at the growing awareness that our future is bound to the life and health of our rivers. In the wake of dam removals, such as the Elwha and Glines Canyon dams in Clallam County, rivers have rebounded, giving salmon and other wild fish the right of return to primeval spawning grounds. *DamNation*, with its majestic cinematography, will screen via Zoom, at 6:30 Monday evening. A community discussion will follow, with guests including Jefferson County Commissioner Heidi Eisenhour, Nez Perce tribal member Julian Matthews, and local fisherman Amy Grondin.
