

Hello again! This is Derek Firenze with your local news and commentary for Thursday, October 26, 2023 on KPTZ 91.9 FM in Port Townsend, Washington.

Construction is quieting down, while still continuing, at Point Hudson as work on the new south jetty moves from the demolition phase into reconstruction. The first steel pilings have already been installed to replace the previous wooden creosote pilings. Creosote can have adverse effects on marine life, which means not only does the new jetty ensure the safety of the vessels at Point Hudson but also the creatures living below the surface. The previous creosote-soaked timber and riprap jetty was first constructed in 1934, before successive repairs in 1969 and 1996. It lived well past its anticipated design life and was deteriorating at an accelerating rate. The new jetty is projected to last 60 years.

While that nearly 100 year-old jetty seems rather ancient, it was around for barely a blink of an eye compared to how long human beings have been navigating these waters. Investigating the exact origins and early history of sailing on the oceans, however, is a particularly difficult challenge for archaeologists. Since ancient boats were made of organic materials which are rarely preserved for long periods of time, direct evidence is lacking, and claims require indirect arguments. The view is also limited by our knowledge of past sea levels and how they affected the world's geography.

If you're curious to learn more, a presentation on "The Origins of Marine Sailing" is scheduled to be given by Gary Wessen at the Northwest Maritime Center on Friday, October 27 at 7:00pm. The presentation will consider some anthropological ideas about cultural adaptations to maritime environments, what kinds of indirect arguments can be used to evaluate possible evidence, and a summary of what currently available evidence from around the world suggests about the antiquity of this type of activity.
