The partial government shutdown that began last weekend ended this Tuesday when the House approved and President Trump signed the funding package the Senate amended last week. The package only offers 2 weeks of funding for the Department of Homeland Security, while leaders in Congress and the administration seek consensus on changes to how immigration officers should operate following the recent killings in Minneapolis.

According to the *Washington State Standard*, House speaker Mike Johnson wants negotiations to address local and state governments that don't cooperate with federal immigration enforcement activities, while the democrats plan to insist that federal immigration agents:

- Wear body cameras
- Only wear masks to conceal their identities in "extraordinary and unusual circumstances"
- Do not undertake roving patrols
- Do not detain people in certain locations, like houses of worship, schools, or polling places
- Do not engage in racial profiling
- Do not detain or deport American citizens

In addition to providing two more weeks of funding for the Department of Homeland Security, the \$1.2 trillion spending package includes full-year appropriations bills for the departments of Defense, Education, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, Labor, State, Transportation, and Treasury. Congress had already approved half of the dozen annual appropriations bills for the fiscal year that began back on October 1.

The aircraft supercarrier USS Theodore Roosevelt sailed into Port Townsend Bay this past Monday on its way to Indian Island. The carrier, which houses 5500 sailors, left San Diego on January 21 and conducted training exercises while at sea, including aviator and small arms qualifications. The ship is the fourth Nimitz-class, nuclear-powered aircraft carrier in the United States Navy.

The Port Townsend City Council has authorized staff to move forward with an application to designate the huge Douglas fir located across the street from the Mountain View Commons on the city-owned golf course as a landmark tree. According to the *Leader*, the tree in question is associated with a documented act of racial violence, in which a Chemakum man named Kia-a-han was lynched by a vigilante mob in the 19th century and hanged from the fir tree's branches for killing a roaming steer who belonged to a non-Native farmer in Chimacum. Concerned that the designation needs to serve as an educational opportunity rather than a celebration, the city has consulted with both the Jamestown SKlallam Tribe and the Chemakum Tribe before proceeding.

The city's landmark tree program was established in 2003 to recognize the significance of certain trees to the community and to ensure they receive special protection and are eligible for city assistance in their stewardship.
